The Rolincs were recently selected by LeadingAge PA (formerly PANPHA) as the recipients of the 2011 Distinguished Service Award for Volunteer of the Year-Group. LeadingAge PA is a statewide association of nonprofit senior service providers.

The Rolincs received the award for their extensive work in developing and growing a store, THE MARKETPLACE, run by and for Woodcrest Villa residents. For the convenience of residents, The Marketplace is located in Bluebird Wing, just inside the Garden Café, making it easy for residents to stop by four days a week from 9 a.m. until



2 p.m. With the ongoing commitment and energy of the Rolincs, THE MARKETPLACE provides residents with more than 400 different grocery products at a reasonable price without having to leave the comfort of their community.

Thanks to the efforts of the Rolincs and the 35 other resident volunteers, since 2008 THE MARKETPLACE has raised thousands of dollars that have been re-invested into the community. In January 2010, the Rolincs announced that THE MARKETPLACE would be donating \$10,000 to the benevolent care fund at Mennonite Home.

- One Family's Story -

My name is Heather Watts and I am blessed to be a new Homemaker in Wissler Run, learning the culture of person centered care and how to fulfill our residents' "daily pleasures."

On Friday, June 17, I was making evening rounds, visiting with residents and learning their life stories. Earlier I had talked with Kathy, whose father Stanley was very ill. With tear-filled eyes, she shared her fear of losing her father this very weekend. It broke my heart to think of losing your father on Father's Day weekend!

I quietly approached Stanley to see if he needed anything. We reminisced about his life in Pittsburgh, the Steelers, and his favorite pastime, fishing. He told me how much he missed fishing and instantly my mind was going 100 miles per hour!

When Kathy and her husband returned, I shared our conversation and my idea to take Stan fishing in the creek behind Mennonite Home. Kathy was thrilled and thought that if Stan wanted to go fishing, that would be wonderful!





Kathy mentioned that his nephew and his wife were visiting the next day from Pittsburgh. Stan's first comment was "I can't go fishing!" Kathy and I just looked at each other and laughed because we hadn't mentioned fishing yet! It was as if he read our minds! I told him about tomorrow's fishing trip and that I would take care of all the details.

At home, I told my husband "I need the fishing rods!" He laughed because I had never been fishing before. I was determined to learn because Stan had shared that he never went fishing with his daughter; this made it even more important! This adventure would fulfill Stan's dream and make a wonderful memory for his family.

Our fishing adventure began as I shopped for bait, looking at the different types. The helpful girl at the register opened a container of huge fat worms and pulled one out to show me!

When I got to work, Stan was making motions with his hands as if he was reeling in a fish. I asked him if he was ready to go fishing and he looked confused - he thought I was kidding. "Get some rest - everything we need is in my car."

Soon Kathy walked in with a huge smile on her face and said, "He is ready and he wants to go!" We got him into a wheelchair and informed the nurse that Stan was going fishing. Stan's nephew and his wife from Pittsburgh and grandson and his wife from Philadelphia joined our adventure. What a great day-surrounded by a loving family and creating a cherished moment! I was grateful that Stan's family was allowing me to be a part of this day.

Once Stan was ready, we set off for our Father's Day fishing adventure. While Stan reminisced with his family, I chuckled to hear him saying, "I can't believe I am actually going fishing" and "Who would have ever thought this would be happening?" We found a spot under a large shade tree and I retrieved the supplies.

We spent several hours by the creek that afternoon; the guys would bait the hooks, cast, and bring the rod to Stan. He had many bites but we weren't having any luck. Stan talked about how the creek reminded him of one he fished near his cabin, old fishing buddies, and stories about his days in Pittsburgh. Finally, on the last worm, a fish took the bait. His family watched as Stan reeled in a sunfish. It was a proud moment because Stan caught a fish!

This summer, Kathy Cassidy shared some of her reflections on her father's special fishing trip: "Although Dad received great care at Mennonite Home, his ever-growing cancer limited his activities. Dad was so elated and grateful for the chance to go fishing once more, accompanied by the family he cherished. Our cheer of 'Great catch, Gramps' as he pulled in the fish is a cherished phrase, etched in our memories."

"When we think back on Dad's time at Mennonite Home, the fishing trip is just one of a series of wonderful examples of the support he received. It stands as a benchmark for how the staff provided Dad with outstanding care through his final days. The staff always went over and above our expectations."



The Mennonite Home Communities recently formed Wellness Committee has been off to an enthusiastic start. Comprised of staff members from various departments throughout the organization, the committee began earlier this year to promote health and wellness among employees.

To date, the results have been overwhelmingly positive. Staff are sharing healthy eating tips and recipes in the daily employee newsletter. Ninety employees formed a walking club.
