WHEN THINGS GET HOT

Larry Folly loves his job as President of the Rohrerstown Fire Department. After 25 years on the job, he readily admits that firefighting is a young man's job. Yet his experience and wisdom qualify him to teach and certify younger firefighters and help them master this lifesaving skill. Larry is very proud that Rohrerstown Fire Department was the first in Lancaster County, and the seventh in the state, to have 75% of their firefighters board certified. We are truly lucky to have these men and women on the job!

Larry explained how the response to a potential fire at Woodcrest Villa or Mennonite Home has been carefully planned and rehearsed in advance because of the number of lives at risk. After all, firefighters are about saving lives and Mennonite Home Communities represent 900 resident and 550 employee lives. Firefighters always plan for the worst case, and they always over respond. Nothing is left to chance.

Rohrerstown Fire Department is staffed 24/7 with 12 live-in firemen at the station, allowing them to respond

quickly. A basic one-alarm fire at Mennonite Home Communities would attract four engines to pump water, three trucks with firemen to search, rescue and extinguish the fire as well as three specialized rescue trucks. Over 40 firefighters and their command structure would arrive within minutes from Rohrerstown, Hempfield, East Petersburg, Eden and West Lancaster Fire Departments. A second alarm would quickly double the equipment and manpower.

Larry mentioned fund raising, recruitment and retention as the significant challenges facing their department. Before a new recruit can even ride to a fire, they must complete 150 hours of training and have \$2,500 worth of protective clothing and a \$2,500 air pack apparatus. All recruits face continuous extensive training and eventual independent professional certification.

I could certainly dedicate many pages to describe the equipment, procedures, challenges and bravery of our firemen. This life saving service deserves our admiration, unending thankfulness, and financial support. Please remember all that these men and women give to our communities every single day.



OF PROTECTION

EMERGENCY SERVICE ON-SITE

When you have a medical emergency, you want to know that there is someone ready to help you. You want someone who is quick to respond, quick to know what to do, and quick to care about what is ailing you. You want someone now! Lancaster County has wonderful emergency medical services, and Susquehanna Valley Emergency Medical Service is one of the best. At least, that's how Woodcrest Villa residents feel.

In November 2002, SVEMS began providing services to Woodcrest Villa from a site right on the Woodcrest Villa property. There is no similar relationship between a retirement community and an emergency crew in the county. SVEMS responded to over 600 calls at Mennonite Home Communities in

2005, but the rest of the surrounding community can rest assured that they continue to serve them as well. In fact, in 2005 alone, they responded to close to 16,000 requests for service, emergency and non-emergency. They expect to respond to well over that total, having just merged with Willow Street EMS in December 2005. SVEMS has a committed group of employees with an average of nine years of service. They also have dedicated volunteers who give of their time to benefit the community.

Mennonite Home Communities wholeheartedly thanks Susquehanna Valley EMS and the other emergency crews in Lancaster County who dedicate their lives to save the lives of others every single day.

LOTS OF EXPERIENCE, LOTS OF RESPONSIBILITY

The residents and staff of Mennonite Home can rest assured knowing that their safety is in the experienced hands of Manheim Township's Chief of Police, Paul Rager. During Chief Rager's 40 year career, Manheim Township has grown from 18,000 to 37,500 residents. In that time Mennonite Home has grown from 33 to 200 skilled nursing residents, from 80 to 200 Assisted Living residents and from 64 to over 440 staff members.

Policing Manheim Township is a 24/7 job requiring the talents and energies of 53 police officers and 18 civilians in supporting roles. The cars, radios, computers, record keeping systems and communication networks of today help deliver an efficient response to nearly 20,000 calls per year (an average of 55

calls per day). A specialized "mobile command center" includes all necessary investigative technologies, including global positioning systems, to accurately map, collect evidence and analyze accident or crime scenes.

Retirement communities pose special considerations for police because of the health status of the population. It is crucial for 911 to get accurate information so the proper combination of police and EMS can be dispatched.

Mennonite Home is delighted to enjoy the protection of Chief Rager's corps of officers and support staff. Remember to call 911 for all emergencies and to call 664-1180 for non-emergency situations requiring a Manheim Township police officer.



WHO AND WHERE

The 911 system is truly the keystone that holds together the calls of people seeking any emergency assistance.

The 911 center uses computer data bases, communications and maps to direct over 1,000 calls per day to dispatch the appropriate police, fire or EMS service. But 911 and emergency responders must know exactly where people are located.

Skip Walls, an analyst for the 911 center, explains that retirement communities are challenging because only one general office phone number and address show up in the 911 computer.

Skip is delighted that Mennonite Home Communities is installing Lancaster County's first "Enhanced-911" system tied to our new phone system. Even if a resident should be rendered unconscious after dialing 911, "Enhanced-911" will identify the resident, building, wing and apartment or room number, notify our front desk personnel, and tell responder personnel which building, entrance and elevator to use. This is life saving technology at its best!

CHAPEL/PERFORMANCE CENTER

The Board of Trustees has long envisioned a place of worship and performance serving the Woodcrest Villa (WCV) community. Our growth now supports this dream. Extending from the Community Center, the Chapel/Performance Center will be centrally located for apartment residents and provide ample parking for villa dwellers.

The Chapel and a private prayer room will occupy the top floor. As our Chapel, this reverent space will house worship services, hymn sings, Bible study, prayer, weddings and funerals. As our Performance Center, the facility will host town meetings, lectures, movies, various musical entertainments and more. Good acoustical design, amplification, projection and hearing-assist devices will compliment comfortable theater-style seating and a raised stage to ensure that residents and guests thoroughly enjoy all events.

The lower levels of the Chapel/Performance Center will contain an expanded game room, space for arts and crafts, a computer training center, an attractive beauty salon and additional facilities for wellness professionals.
